The Health and Wellbeing Prefects submitted evidence of their campaign to educate pupils in Health and Wellbeing . The pupils' campaign had to meet the following criteria from the Dairy Council

- be based around positive messaging on nutrition and health
- be based on researched facts
- include all food groups that are seen on the Eatwell plate
- discuss milk, cheese and yogurt in the context of a healthy diet
- encourage physical activity
- be mindful of the environment particularly food waste reduction.

There were seven schools from Scotland selected and invited to this event. Menzieshill High School were one of the seven. Olympian Euan Burton was there to talk to the pupils and present their awards to them. The pupils from Menzieshill High School were selected and awarded a Silver Dairy Council Award which was a fantastic achievement.

The Queen's Baton Relay is a much loved tradition of the Commonwealth Games and symbolises the coming together of all Commonwealth nations and territories in preparation for the four-yearly festival of sport and culture.

The Glasgow 2014 Queen's Baton Relay is the curtain-raiser to the XX Commonwealth Games. Over a period of 288 days the baton will visit 70 nations and territories, cover 190,000 kilometres and involve a third of the world's population, making it the world's most engaging relay.

Computing


Over the past eight years senior pupils from Menzieshill High School have taken part in the Schools' 'Dare To Be Digital' computer games competition at the University of Abertay; being outright winners on several of those years.

To continue close ties with Dundee's Game Development industry, nine senior computing pupils have joined in a development project to produce a fully functional game with students from Coral Springs High School and McFatter Technical College in the USA.

The overall game will have a number of levels and pupils from Menzieshill will create two levels of these. The production and technical support will be offered by local games development company YOYO Games and computing teacher Mr Ghafoor; however the overall management of the project is being carried out by the same very confident and committed pupils.

It is hoped that the game will be completed in the early part of 2014. The experience gained in this project will certainly benefit the pupils who wish to follow a career in computing, games development or management.

Linking Education & Employment

This session groups of our pupils have been working with pupils in three Florida schools as part of the Linking Education and Employment Outcomes (LEEO) International Project. Menzieshill High School are piloting this international project which involves pupils working collaboratively across the Atlantic, making use of different forms of information technology to facilitate this process.

Menzieshill High pupils have been working with pupils from Coral Springs High School and McArthur High School, both located in Southern Florida. S2 pupils have been communicating with American pupils in their Inter Disciplinary Learning periods on a Monday afternoon. Based on the positive reaction to this initial pilot we are also trialing a similar process with a group of S3 pupils.

Pupils in both the different year groups are collaborating on the issue of alternative sources of energy. This has involved pupils communicating with US pupils via web conferences and other forms of IT, with the aim of producing and delivering joint presentations comparing the merits of different sources of energy.

A key aim of the project is developing employability skills and pupils have been working with staff from Scottish and Southern Energy to develop the skills employers would be looking for in potential employees.



In addition, the employer mentors have delivered sessions to pupils on the renewable energy and we plan to take advantage of their offer to visit some of Scottish and Southern Energy's facilities.



The renewable energy sector is developing into a major employment driver in the local area and offers the potential of an exciting and very rewarding career path for pupils. Feedback from staff, pupils and our employer mentors has been very positive.

Mr Hulse (Maths) and Miss McCubbin (Design and Technology) are the teachers involved with these groups.

Some of our senior pupils are now also working with US students as they collaborate on the development of a computer game which we hope will be turned into a mobile phone App.

Senior pupils from this Higher Computing class are also working with another local employer mentor, YoYo Games, to manage the process of developing their tasks as part of a three way team involving our school and pupils from Coral Springs High School and McFatter Technical College in Southern Florida.

The pupils have already identified their tasks and will now be working with groups of US pupils under the project management advice of their employer mentors. Mr Ghafoor (Computing) is the teacher taking this group.

Pupils in all the groups have been very excited about the chance to work with American pupils and staff have commented on the positive impact on pupil motivation. The LEEO project aims to develop key employability skills as well as softer skills such as teamwork, communication, presentation and problem solving skills.

The international dimension of the project aims to develop the type of skills which pupils will increasingly require in a globalised international economy. Pupils have already had to deal with challenges such as the compatibility of different versions of software and technology, working with colleagues across different time-zones and from different culture backgrounds as well as the challenges in communication caused by different dialects!



As a result of the establishment of links with the Florida schools, the school is looking at options to further develop opportunities for collaboration in the future.

Science

Science Department

On December 16th all S1 pupils took part in the Science Christmas Challenge.

Their challenge was to work in house teams of 4-6 pupils to build from waste materials, an eco-friendly Christmas

tree. Pupils spent a week and a half collecting suitable materials from home to use in the challenge.

Part of the challenge was for pupils to decorate the Christmas tree with homemade decorations, some of which were made in collaboration with the Art department.

Pupils were given 40 minutes to work in teams to build their Christmas trees which had to fit several criteria including be at least five feet tall, be free standing, have one of the decorations on the top and have at least one homemade decoration for each pupil in the group.

Prizes were awarded for the tallest free standing tree, best decorated tree and the most justifiable eco-friendly tree.

Chemistry Department

On 2nd September 2013 40 National 4 and National 5 Chemistry pupils attended a lecture entitled "Fantastic Plastic" at Abertay University.

The lecture was organised by the Royal Society of Chemistry and gave

pupils an insight into how the future of plastics may be shaped including TVs that can be rolled up and taken anywhere to watch without the need for wires.

The lecture also enhanced some of the chemistry pupils are taught in class showing pupils the relevance of what they are learning to the outside world.

Chemical demonstrations allowed pupils to be wowed by reactions showing unusual properties of plastics while enhancing their background knowledge from the classroom.

An enjoyable lecture enjoyed by all.

Maths

Environmental Engineering Project

Congratulations to a team of seven first year pupils – under the guidance of Mr. Squair from the Maths department- who have won the regional heat, and £250 for

the school, in an environmentally themed project aimed at reducing the school's usage of mains water.

The project, administered by the Engineering Development Trust, will next see the team participate in the national final, to be held in the Scottish Parliament in May. The Trust sponsors such projects with the aim of encouraging young people to follow careers in science, technology, engineering and maths. Working with a

mentor from local industry-Mr. C. Arnold of Johnston Matthey Battery Systems-the team produced a design whereby rain, falling on the roof surfaces of the school, could be collected, lightly cleaned and used to replace mains water in the toilet cisterns. The final design demanded research, many measurements and difficult calculations.

The team attended a Celebration and Assessment Day at Dundee University where their ideas were presented using posters, a booklet and a model. Each member of the group had to talk about their particular contribution, with an introduction and conclusion being presented by the project leader.

Thanks are especially extended to Mr C Arnold for his help and advice, and for organising an interesting factory visit. Also to Mr J Waghorn of the Technical department for the construction of a model showing the final design.
